INTERVIEWER: INTRODUCE YOURSELF!

Daynia La-Force:

"I am Daynia La-Force, a child of God, Daughter, Mother, Wife, Coach and Activist. After 23 years of coaching women's college basketball at several institutions, I have become active in bringing awareness to the social and racial injustice that exists in America. Coaching has taught me that it takes a total team effort and likeminded individuals to make change. Whether that change is on or off the court, a collective group that sets goals and works together to achieve those goals can accomplish anything."

Daynia La-Force: "I am the only child of Trevor and Lucia Scholar, immigrants from St Lucia which is also where I was born. I married Eddie Benton Jr in 2019 and together we run a basketball training business called BentForce Basketball (bentforcebasketball.com) based in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. I have two beautiful children, Terance Mann (24) and Martin Mann (22)."

INTERVIEWER: WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO DO YOUR SHOW?

Daynia La-Force: "I was inspired to bring awareness to the racial injustice in America when George Floyd was murdered. His call for his mother shook my soul."

"If a man staring death in the face calls for his mother, then mothers are looked upon as saviors to their children. Do we recognize the power of our role? Is it possible that we hold the key to protecting, educating, and molding our children? As a mother of 2 boys, the answer is YES. I was and will always be their first teacher. I will always be their first role model.

Daynia La-Force: "I am the one person, since birth, who protected them from everything, including holding them in my arms from the moment of their birth, picking them up when they fell, and nurturing them when they were hungry. Mothers are indeed powerful. We raise our children to be who they are. Sometimes we feel there are things we cannot

control such as police brutality and systemic racism."

"My organization, Mothers Against Racism, gives that control back to the mothers of the world. Together, as a team, we can not only raise quality children but also ones who can change society to reflect equality and justice for all! My goal was to empower mothers, give them a voice, educate them, and provide the resources needed to raise socially conscious individuals armed to be a catalyst for change and to embrace diversity."

Daynia La-Force: "Our show gives mothers a voice and power. It gives them a platform to demand change in legislation and break the chain of systemic racism. We interview mothers who hold significant roles in society such as lawyers, judges, legislators etc.. Mothers who witness racism daily and despite their status, fear for the lives of their own children and many others. I hope, by hearing their stories, we can change the hearts and minds by igniting empathy from those who discriminate and oppress."

Daynia La-Force: "My son is Terance Mann. He is in his second year as a member of the LA Clippers. He was a second-round draft pick in the 2019 NBA draft. Terance has emerged into being a valuable player for the team. Despite the odds, he has been resilient. I am very proud of his commitment and dedication to the process. Terance grew up as a coach's son and learned the game through the eyes of a coach. This enhanced his basketball IQ and his commitment to playing the right way."

If she could move all the stumbling blocks and sometimes she thinks she could.

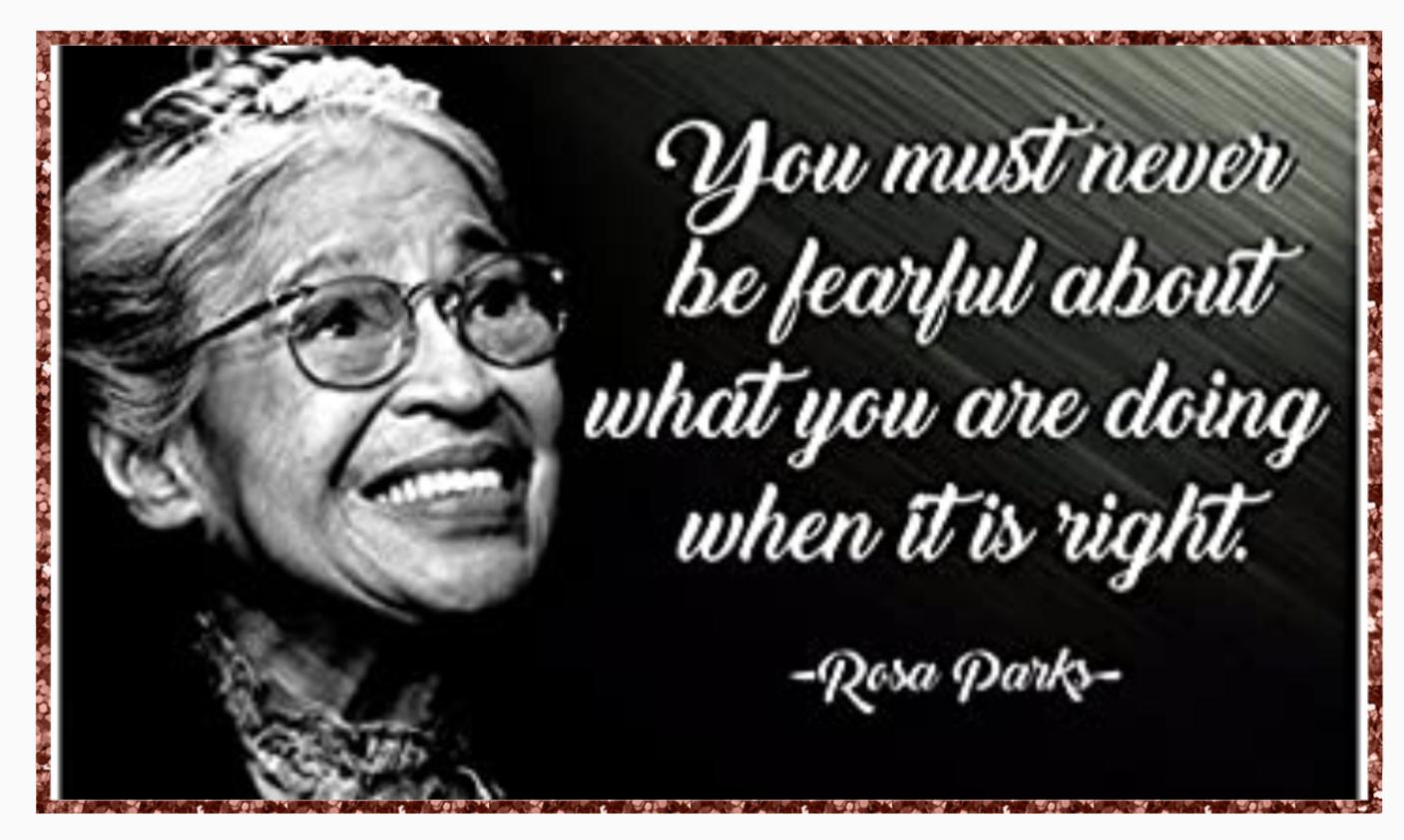
But that's just a Mom's opinion,

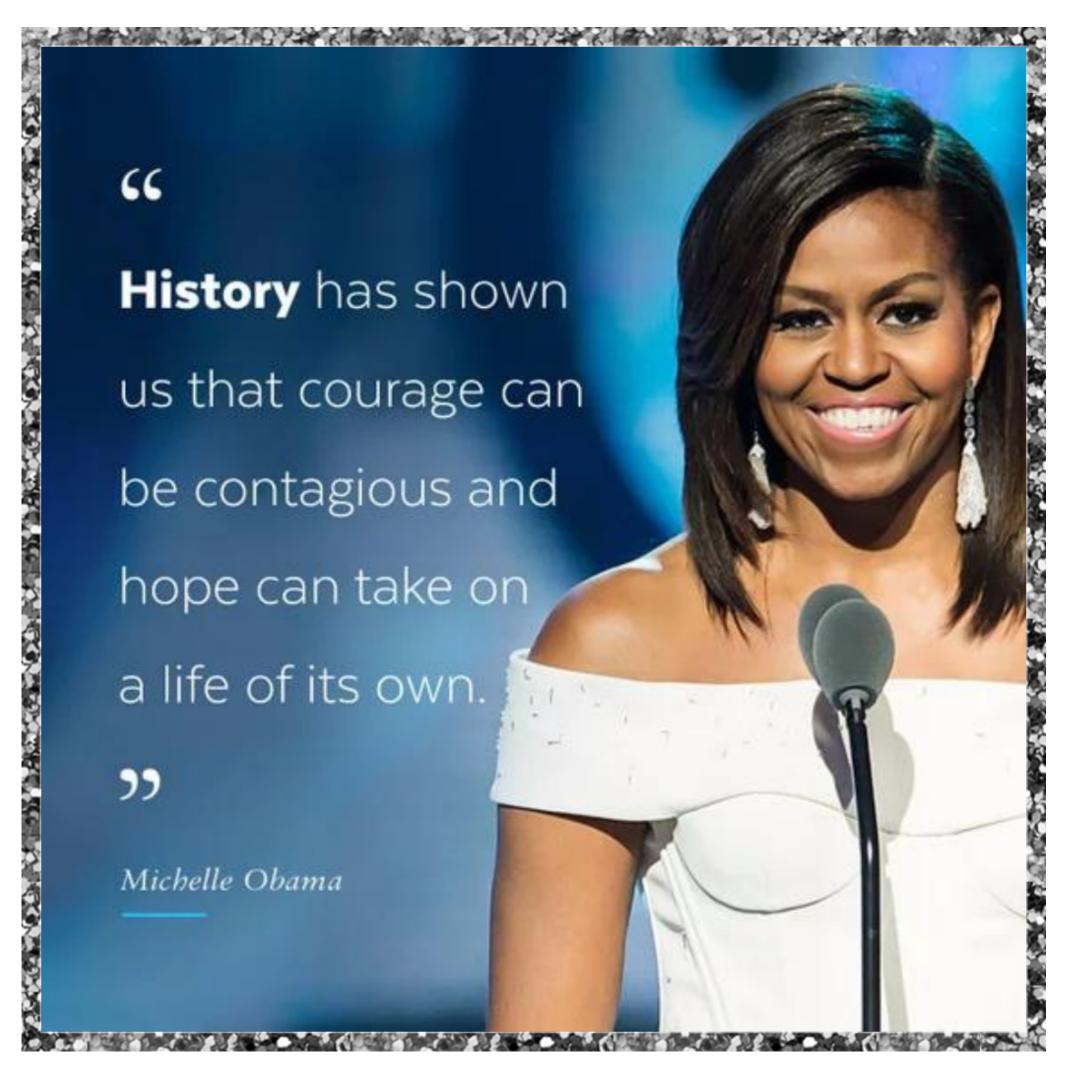

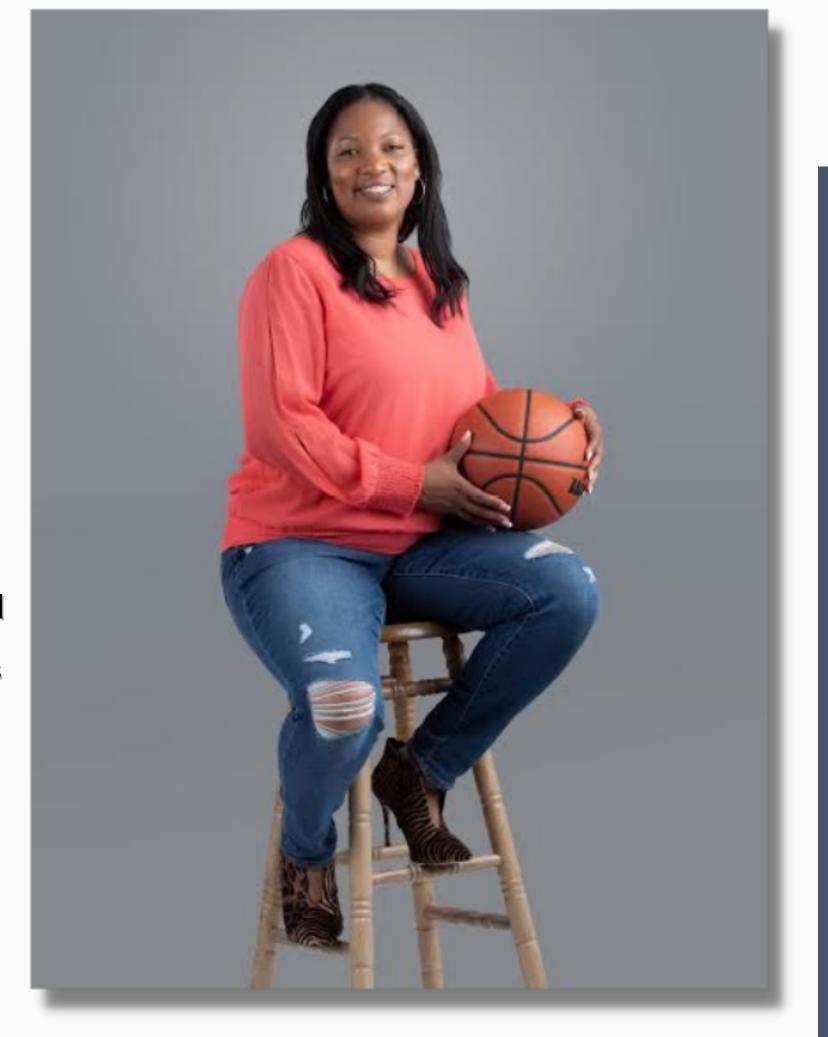


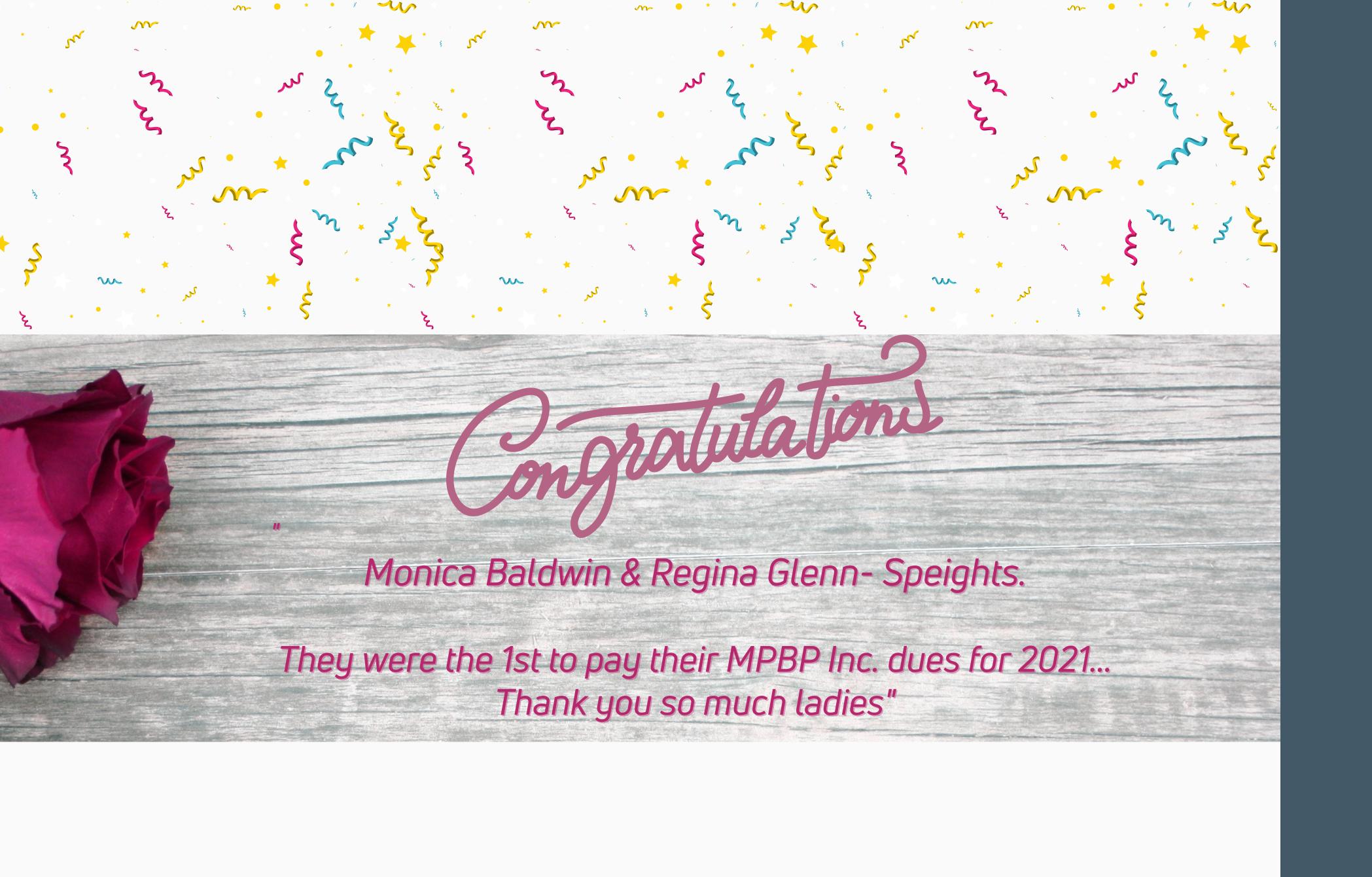


SPECIAL GUEST: Wendy Sparks

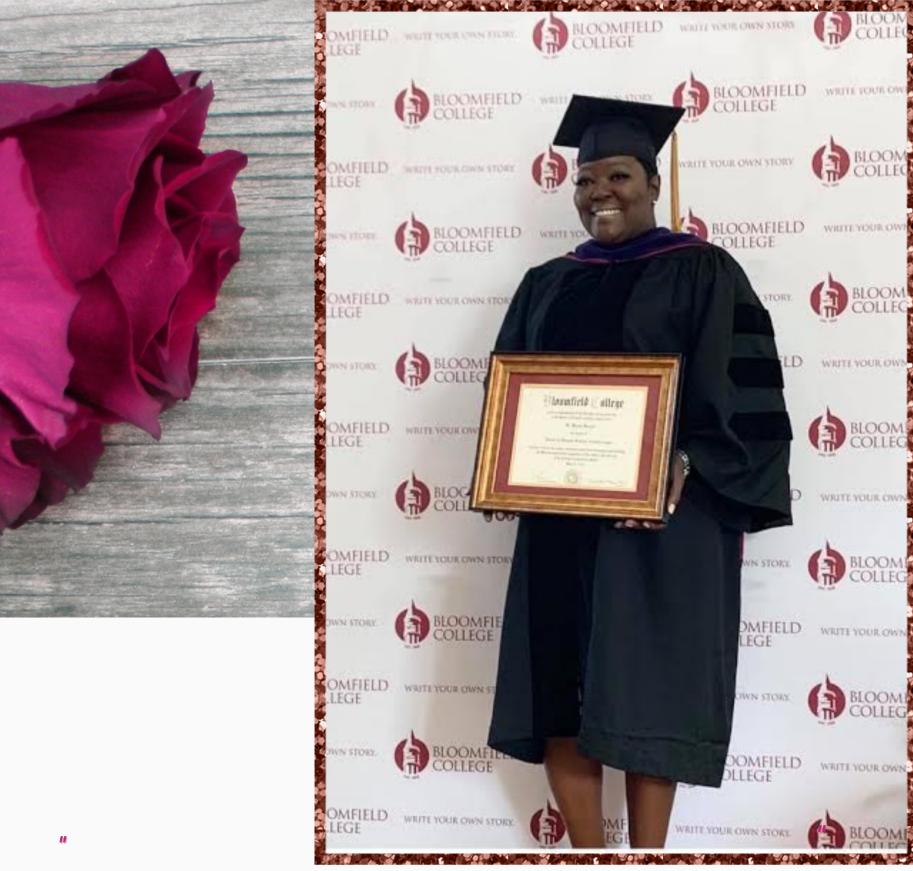
